

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### 1. HOW THE GROUP WAS CREATED

- It was the year 1998. Because the Stigmatine community of the American Province was dwindling and there are no new vocations coming in, the Province decided to establish a group of dedicated lay people to assist them in praying for vocations and assisting them in various lay ministries.
- Father Bob Masciocchi, CSS was appointed to this ministry, and this group was called the <u>Lay Associate Stigmatines</u>.
- Six months of discernment were provided to those who answered this call.
- Those who decided to go on to becoming Lay Associate Stigmatines then attended a year of formation in 2000.
- On Jan. 23, 2001 the first Lay Associate Stigmatines made their 'promises' at a Mass celebrated in the Stigmatine Retreat House (in Waltham, MA) by <u>Fr.</u> <u>Gregory Hoppough</u>, <u>Superior Provincial</u>, welcoming these first Lay Associate Stigmatines.
- This original group was composed by 9 ladies (I was one of them).
- Our meetings are always in the campus of the Province of the Holy Spouses, in Waltham, Massachusetts, USA.

### 2. OUR RULES AND GUIDELINES 1

- Attend the monthly formation days for Lay Associate Stigmatines
- Attend the Community feast day celebrations
- Attend the annual retreat for Lay Associate Stigmatines
- Renew the PROMISE<sup>2</sup> annually
- Assist the Stigmatine priests
- Support the charism of the Stigmatine Community in the American Province
- Assist at the Retreat House and other buildings on the Waltham campus
- Ministry in our local parishes
- Ministry in our local community

### 3. ADMISSION OF NEW MEMBERS

- When one decides to become a Lay Stigmatine, he/she is accepted as a candidate for a period of a year. At the conclusion of the year, on one of the Stigmatine feast days, the candidate takes the Promise\* at the altar in the presence of the Stigmatine Father Provincial and the entire Stigmatine Community.
- After taking the Promise, you sign a copy of it on the altar, and are presented with a cross, which we wear whenever we have meetings and Feast Days.

### 4. SPIRITUAL DEVELOPMENT

- The Spiritual Development is an ongoing process.
- We have a formation meeting on the morning of the first Saturday, every month. The presenter is one of the Stigmatine Fathers, in regular basis the Spiritual Director of our group.
- We also gather on the Stigmatine Feast days, when, after the afternoon Mass, we are invited for a dinner with all the Stigmatine community.
- Each member is asked to find a personal spiritual director, preferably one of the Stigmatine Fathers.

### 5. OUR CURRENT GROUP

- We have only one group, in Waltham, MA, including 'remote' members.
- Our current group is formed by 12 members in Waltham, 2 in Texas and 1 in California.
- The 2 members in Texas are originally from the Province of the Holy Cross in Brazil.
- The member in California is parishioner of the Holy Cross Parish, under the care of the Stigmatines from 2005 to 2013.
- Our current Spiritual Director is Father Joseph Henchey, CSS.

### 6. OUR ACTIVITIES

As Lay Stigmatines, we are asked to find a ministry, something along the lines of the spirituality of the Founder St. Gaspar Bertoni. Likewise, we have our Catholic life in our parishes, communities and in our midst. So, let us consider our activities under these 2 approaches.

### **6.1. AS LAY STIGMATINES** (specifically)

- Serving/leading programs at the Retreat House
- Staffing the Gift Shop
- Assisting the Stigmatine retired priests at St. Joseph's Hall
- Assisting priests in their academic pursuits
- Visiting Stigmatines in nursing homes
- Updating Stigmatine Computers
- Organizing Stigmatine offices
- Making Stigmatine "souvenirs" (magnets, handbags, prayer cards)

### [b] Through Internet

- Co-Authoring the <u>HISTORY of the AMERICAN PROVINCE</u> (for the bicentennial in 2016)
- Establish the website of the Province (www.stigmatines.com)
- Establish the website "A Tribute to St. Gaspar Bertoni" (www.st-bertoni.com), with Stigmatine works by Father Joseph Henchey, CSS
- Establish a BLOG (www.stigmatines.com/blog), for greater communication

### [c] International

- Teaching English at the Stigmatine Seminaries in Thailand from December to March - since December, 2011
- Visited Stigmatine Seminaries in India and in the Philippines
- Attended 1<sup>st</sup> International Conference of Lay Associate Stigmatines in Verona, Italy 2010

- Helping the interchange of information between the Stigmatines in Brazil and in the U.S. (members from Brazil were Lay Stigmatines of the Province of the Holy Cross in Brazil)
- Translation of documents (English <-> Portuguese)

### 6.2. IN OUR CATHOLIC LIFE, IN GENERAL

### [a] In our local Parishes

- Teaching: RCIA, Marian Consecration, The Consoling Heart of Jesus
- Assist with Liturgy: Eucharistic Ministers, Altar servers, Lectors, etc; assist Holy Day services;
- Parish Service Organizations: Knights of Columbus (founded by a Lay Associate Stigmatine in Waltham, MA); Parish Council Membership; planning committees, etc;
- Attend diocesan meetings when asked;
- Participation on a pastoral in assistance to a home-school for abandoned and/or under-nourished children in Honduras.

- Visiting the sick; praying the Rosary in local nursing homes; assisting adults with disabilities;
- Patient and Family Advisory Council @ St. Elizabeth Medical Center in Boston, MA;
- Participation in the 'Plano Citizens Police Academy Alumni Association'<sup>3</sup>
- Annual nation-wide programs:
  - "America Needs Fatima" Rally;
  - Hike for Life;
  - Parades against abortion on the anniversary of Roe x Wade, that came to legalize abortion in all the country (on January 22, 1973).<sup>4</sup>



















### APPENDIX III Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception Washington, D.C.<sup>6</sup>



The Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception is a prominent Roman Rite Catholic basilica located in Washington, D.C., United States of America, honoring the Blessed Virgin Mary as Our Lady of the Immaculate Conception, the principal Patroness of the United States of America. The shrine is the largest Catholic church in the United States, and the tallest habitable building in Washington, D.C.

In 1847, Our Lady of Immaculate Conception was proclaimed the principal patroness of the United States by Pope Pio IX. In the following years, some priests considered to built a sanctuary honoring the patroness of the country.


The construction of the church, notable for its Neo-Byzantine architecture, began in 1920. It opened unfinished in 1959. An estimated one million pilgrims visit the basilica each year.

The basilica is designated both as the national and patronal Catholic Church of the United States, honoring the Virgin Mary, under the *Immaculate Conception*, by which Pope Pius XI donated a mosaic of the same image in 1923.

The Shrine was visited by Popes John Paul II, who designated the National Shrine as a Minor Basilica on October 12, 1990, and Benedict XVI, who bestowed the honor of a Golden Rose on the Basilica. Pope Francis plans to visit the shrine this fall in late September, where he will say a Mass on the mall of The Catholic University of America.



The basilica houses 70 chapels honoring Mary and reflecting the origins of the Catholic immigrants and religious orders whose generosity erected them. Its Greek-styled interior is crowned with numerous domes decorated in mosaics, similar to the Basilica of St. Mark in Venice, Italy, but much larger. The mosaics feature American renditions of traditional Catholic images.

The shrine was built in the style of medieval churches, relying on masonry walls and columns in place of structural steel and reinforced concrete.



The shrine was designed to hold 3,500 worshipers sitting (6,000 in the total), and includes modern amenities such as a basement cafeteria, hidden public address speakers to carry speech at the altar to the rear of the building, air conditioning and the largest (in 1959) radiant heating slab in the world.



In all, 70 chapels and sacred images flank the sides of the upper church and crypt. It contains many works of art. There are arches outlined with iridescent Pewabic Pottery tile, large ceramic medallions set in the ceiling, and 14 Stations of the Cross for the crypt.
